COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS

January 23, 2019

The Board of County Commissioners of Madison County, Nebraska met in regular session at 9:30 A.M.

Advance notice of the meeting was published in the Jan. 17, 2019 edition of The Norfolk Daily News. Copy of said notice was mailed to each Board member and affidavit of acknowledgment of receipt of notice of meeting as published was executed.

County Chairman Ron Schmidt called the meeting to order and notified the public of the posted copy of the Open Meetings Act, which was followed by a moment of silence and the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States of America. Present: Commissioners Christian Ohl, Ron Schmidt, and Troy Uhlir, and County Clerk Anne Pruss.

Commissioner Uhlir read the following consent agenda items into this record:

RESOLUTION #2019-3

WHEREAS, the County of Madison, Nebraska is a member of the Northeast Nebraska Solid Waste Coalition; and
WHEREAS, as a member of the Northeast Nebraska Solid Waste Coalition the County of Madison, Nebraska is authorized to name a representative and alternate representative to the Board of Directors of the Northeast Nebraska Solid Waste Coalition; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners of the County of Madison, Nebraska previously adopted Resolution #2015-4 appointing Christian Ohl as the representative and Jim Prauner as the alternate representative of the County of Madison, Nebraska to the Northeast Nebraska Solid Waste Coalition Board of Directors;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals, the County Board of Commissioners of the County of Madison, Nebraska hereby adopts the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Commissioners of the County of Madison, Nebraska that:

- 1) Christian Ohl is hereby appointed as the representative of the County of Madison, Nebraska to the Northeast Nebraska Solid Waste Coalition Board of Directors, and in the event of the absence of Christian Ohl, then Troy Uhlir shall be declared as the alternate representative to the Board and shall act and vote on behalf of the County of Madison, Nebraska; and
- 2) That Christian Ohl shall serve as Madison County's representative and Troy Uhlir shall serve as alternate representative on the Northeast Nebraska Solid Waste Coalition Board of Directors until their resignation from the Board of Directors or until their successors are appointed by resolution of the County Board of Commissioners, whichever shall occur first.

RESOLUTION #2019-4

WHEREAS, Check No. 18120298, dated December 26, 2018, and drawn on the General Fund in the amount of five hundred dollars and zero cents (\$500.00), was made payable to Pfeifer Auto Body Inc., 806 Husker Drive, Madison, Nebraska, and

WHEREAS, said check was not tendered, but remains in the possession of the Madison County Clerk,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Check No. 18120298, dated December 26, 2018, and drawn on the General Fund in the amount of five hundred dollars and zero cents (\$500.00), is hereby cancelled.

Chairman Schmidt said that he had personally reviewed the documents for Economic Development Revolving Loan Funds. He advised that Todd's BBI, Thermal Design, and Weiland, Inc. have completed the retention requirements in regard to the number of employees that had been hired. Commissioner Ohl agreed that local hiring is probably the best economic development that the County has seen in years. He stated that it is good to see these business being successful.

Motion was made by Ohl and seconded by Uhlir to approve the consent agenda. Roll call vote: Ayes, Ohl, Uhlir, and Schmidt. Nays, none. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Ohl and seconded by Uhlir to approve the regular agenda. Roll call vote: Ayes, Ohl, Uhlir, and Schmidt. Nays, none. Motion carried.

Aaron Beckman with AG Specialties was introduced by Commissioner Ohl. Mr. Beckman stated he could use a drone for the road department to assist in monitoring the Elkhorn River that could impede on county roads. He reported that one of these roads is located northeast of Tilden and is starting to get closer to the county road. Mr. Beckman stated that he could do a flyover and use a grid system to see the river erosion sooner so a decision could possibly be made quicker than having someone survey the river. Chairman Schmidt felt that this could also assist with the Noxious Weed department in monitoring the weeds along the river. He advised that the County talked about purchasing an Argo, but a drone could be used. Mr. Beckman advised that he has been operating drones for a period of time and the technology has improved greatly. He explained that the drone he currently operators has a mapping software which can map any place in the United States or in the world in a grid pattern and can take several thousand pictures and turn them into a 2D or 3D map. He said that the measuring of these maps can be within eight inches to a foot within minutes. He explained that what's excellent with this program is that once you get a flight plan established, the drone could fly the flight plan as many times as desired to watch the erosion in progress. He said that with this technology he could tell how much the river is moving closer to the road in a matter of 10 minutes; so, instead of having a surveyor go to these locations and spending four or five hours, AG Specialties could have the data in place and the information could be reviewed numerous times to see what the river is doing. He said that the software will be used for a project for the University of Nebraska to monitor rivers across the State.

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Chairman Schmidt asked if this information could be used by the Corp of Engineers as data tool to see problems that are occurring. Mr. Beckman advised that he wasn't sure. He reported that recently the Emergency Manager contacted him about flooding that was occurring in Antelope County and he was able to use the drone to show the location of where an ice jam was occurring in approximately one hour and the information was shared with the appropriate individuals. Mr. Beckman thought that the Corp of Engineers used Google Earth and this information is only updated every two to four years and this is how they base their maps. He said that if someone goes out and gets this data with a GPS it would take days, but with the drone technology, you are able to have this information in minutes. Mr. Beckman stated that drone technology uses thermal technology so you can see weed growth. He explained that when looking at maps you can see what is dormant right now and this technology could be used by farmers to see what their crops are doing.

Chairman Schmidt asked if this technology could be used for surveying purposes. Mr. Beckman stated that this is possible and that with this technology he is able to do 3D images and get measurements from one structure to another and he would also be able to do elevations. Zoning Administrator Heather McWhorter advised that she needs this information. Mr. Beckman advised that there so many unknown laws and certifications and these laws change daily. Commissioner Ohl agreed that technology is advancing so quickly that it is probably tough for the regulating authorities to keep up with these advances. He reported that on January 15th the National FAA stated that certified pilots are not to fly a drone at any event site but could apply for a permit to fly over locations for approximately an hour. Mr. Beckman indicated that every time that he takes off or lands his drone this information is recorded and downloaded. He said that there are a lot of benefits to using a drone and recently he was able to assist in a search and rescue.

Noxious Weed Superintendent Don Svitak stated that the County used a drone in 2017 and the understanding is that the drone had to stay in the line of sight of the operator. He stated that the County rented an aircraft to fly over the river at a cost of \$700 and the cost to use the drone to cover approximately 2½ miles is \$400, so this must be considered. Commissioner Schmidt asked if the County used a drone for the Noxious Weed Department and located phragmites, could this information be used. Mr. Svitak stated that he would still have to investigate the area.

Mr. Svitak reported that a drone would need to stay a distance from an airport site. Mr. Beckman commented that a drone is an aircraft and that non-certified pilots are advised not to be in the area of an airport. He said that if he went to Weiland Door Company to fly the drone it would not take flight because of the airport GEO fencing lines, but a licensed pilot can contact proper authorities who would provide a code to enter into the area.

Mr. Svitak asked what happens if a drone is flying over someone's property and then shot down. Mr. Beckman replied that it is no different than shooting down an AG pilot which is against FAA regulations. Commissioner Ohl stated that the biggest thing the County is concerned with is the river and rapid advancement of the erosion, but the County has its hands tied because the Corp of Engineers will severely limit what the County can do about this erosion. He asked if the County should be monitoring the situation once a week or once a month. Mr. Beckman advised that this would be the County's decision. He said that it would take approximately 45 minutes to fly this area and provide a detailed image. He stated that he lives on the river and the river isn't moving right now; but, the months of March through October is when river movement is seen, so it would be best to map this area before March so a base line could be established.

No action was taken.

Veterans Service Officer Gregg Hanson discussed office space modifications for the Veteran Service Office in the Extension office building located at 1305 South 13th Street in Norfolk. Commissioner Ohl advised that Mr. Hanson has received a bid to install in a new wall and three doors, but part of his concern is the privacy that Veterans would need. Mr. Hansen showed the Commissioners a map of the building along with a bid from B & B Construction.

Mr. Hanson stated that putting a wall up in the middle of the room would provide compliance with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act and also provide privacy for Veterans who are in distress or need financial help. He explained that the entrance from the east side would be difficult because the back portion of the building in currently being leased. Zoning Administration Heather McWhorter asked who would be working at the reception desk in the entrance and Mr. Hanson stated that the Extension Office would be doing this. Commissioner Ohl reported that the current receptionist is employed by the County and could possibly provide services for both offices; but, this is something that would need to be discussed with the Extension staff. Mr. Hanson stated that he has concerns with the Extension Office and tables that are currently set up. He said that if he has clients who need to use the restrooms, and the Extension Office is holding meeting, the Veterans would need to use the public restroom across the building. Ms. McWhorter stated that with the open room and extension staff doing projects, this may not be something that should be open to the public. Mr. Hanson advised that the Extension Office staff understood sharing of the space when the building was purchased.

Chairman Schmidt asked that sharing the space be completely understood by both offices. Mr. Hanson informed the Commissioners that he has a contractor who is interested in doing this project and if it doesn't get this done before spring, it will be difficult to find another contractor for this small job. He asked when the lease for the tenants expires and Mr. Schmidt advised that the lease is for another four years and there is no intent to dissolve the lease. Commissioner Ohl said that the Extension Office holds numerous meetings in this building, but the building is large enough to accommodate both organizations. Mr. Hanson indicated that there is a potential buyer for the current building that he occupies.

No action was taken.

Chuck Frohberg with Frohberg Electric spoke to the Commissioners about the lighting project that is currently set for bids. Chairman Schmidt stressed that this conversation will be a fact-finding discussion. Mr. Frohberg reported that he received the specs and the instructions for the project were misleading for removing existing fixtures, furnishing, and installing new fixtures because Lighting Consultants won't be removing fixtures. He said that they would be taking off the current lenses, removing the ballasts, and replacing the fixtures with an architectural design light fixture. He explained that this would eliminate the prismatic lenses to step up to a more architectural look. He explained that most of these lights feature provide an indirect light by directing the light upward to bounce off the reflector unlike the current fluorescent tube lighting which shines directly down.

Mr. Frohberg advised that he is currently working with other businesses who are replacing fixtures that are not aging out; but, they furnish and install new lamps to keep the existing fixture. He said that they are doing this type of replacement in buildings of this age because that fixture is in good shape. He reported that the architectural replacement is not cheap, but there are some options that may be a lower price between \$60 and \$200 per fixture. He said that doing this project is very worthwhile because the County could receive a rebate for the bulbs and/or the fixtures, but only Nebraska Public Power District would be able to advise what the savings may be. He stated that the warranty period usually runs about 100,000 hours on the lamps and the maintenance will be similar. Commissioner Ohl asked that if the County would gain savings now but in 15 to 20 years when the technology becomes better, be replacing lighting again. Mr. Frohberg stated that when quotes are received each one must be reviewed so the County knows what they are getting.

Chairman Schmidt explained that if the County puts in new fixtures and the light is too bright, they could put in one or two bulbs to adjust the brightness because there aren't any ballasts. He said that a bonus with LED lights is that once you put in the new bulbs, they will maintain the same brightness unlike the fluorescent bulb which becomes dimmer over time. Mr. Frohberg stated that the board may want to consider the color because there is 3K, 4K, and 5K bulbs. He explained that a 3K is like the old warm light, 4K is cool light, and 5K is a brighter whiter light. He said that they put 5K in many offices because it brightens up the offices. County Assessor Jeff Hackerott said that he doesn't like the white light so he may request 3K lighting in his office. Mr. Frohberg explained that when he presents his product there will be options to choose from. He advised that the warranty periods for these lights is 50,000 or more hours, so in most office situations this will be 15 years or possibly 20 years in some offices. He stated that the fixtures are dimmable and the lamps can be ordered with a special dimming switch. Commissioner Ohl stated that once the lights are in place and an office says that this is too bright the contractor will have to replace the switch with a dimmer switch which will be more costly. Mr. Frohberg agreed with this statement and stated that the bulbs will provide a pay back a little quicker, but the lamps may pay back in three to five years and fixture replacements will take five to seven years to pay back.

No action was taken.

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Deputy Sheriff Jon Downey explained what had occurred this past weekend with the phone system and T1 line that is provided to the County from Frontier. He reported that the phone system went down because the T1 line wasn't functioning. He said that if that occurred between Monday and Friday, it would have been catastrophic for the entire Courthouse. He explained that the only way that the dispatchers could receive a call was through 911 or with cell phones available in dispatch. He reported that Frontier was contacted through an on-call system which posts a trouble ticket that should be picked up by someone. He said that Frontier's response was that it was too dangerous to drive from Columbus that evening. Mr. Downey explained that Dick Day and Fran Pinkelman were contacted and both agreed that it wasn't a County problem, but something outside of the building. He said that Mr. Day finally contacted someone from Frontier on Sunday morning, and after doing extensive trouble shooting at the Courthouse, Frontier finally sent a serviceman to Madison who determined that the problem was with Frontier. He reported that Frontier believes the problem was caused during updates at Tyson Foods which shut down the dispatch center for approximately 28 hours.

Mr. Downey expressed concerns that the phone system needs to get updated now and really should have been done six months ago. He explained that there are individuals who refuse to use the 911 system and will only call directly into the Sheriff's office. Commissioner Ohl advised that the plan is to discuss the phone system in a couple of weeks since at the current time it seems that the Courthouse has a working system. He advised that they will be discussing redundant lines to the Courthouse with Stealth. Mr. Downey reminded everyone that the line to the Courthouse must be replaced so calls can be received and then discussion on replacing the phone system and switchboard should be the next step. Chairman Schmidt was concerned whether money was budgeted for a new switchboard or phone system and Mr. Downey said that he spoke with Dick Day who advised that money has been allocated for a new phone system. Commissioner Schmidt asked who is responsible for the switch board and Mr. Downey replied that currently no one can handle this issue. Commissioner Ohl said that the Courthouse contracts with Connecting Point who could assist. Mr. Downey suggested consulting with Priority Communications representatives Fran Pinkelman and Scott Kudera about this issue since both of these gentlemen have worked with a lot of updates in the Courthouse. He said that the current switch board is obsolete and parts can't be found, but when a VOIP (Voice Over Internet Protocol) system is brought into the Courthouse new handsets will be required.

No action was taken.

Mr. Downey asked about the Aladtec payroll system which apparently isn't being used by any offices except the law enforcement. He said that the County is paying for Aladtec software and Dick Day is firmly committed to using Aldtec which was approved by the Commissioners. Commissioner Ohl advised that the other offices are in training and he will follow up on this matter. He said that a lot of testing was being done to accommodate the Sheriff office. Mr. Downey stated that there was talk that other offices are too busy to learn in, but the Sheriff's office has one or two people who manage the payroll in the Sheriff's Office. He said that one person in each department should be able to learn the Aladtec software for these small offices. Zoning Administrator Heather McWhorter reported that she did the training and it wasn't very clear, so it's difficult to explain to other staff when she doesn't understand the program. She asked if there could be more extensive training on the program. Mr. Downey said that the current Time Tracker is obsolete and if something happens to Mr. Day there is no one who could support the old system. He said that if an office purchases a new computer the Time Tracker program is not compatible to run on a Windows 10 operating system. Ms. McWhorter stated that she had several sessions with Aldtec and she still has issues running the program. County Clerk Anne Pruss said that the Sheriffs office's payroll processes every pay period, but there seems to be issues in the Clerk's office each time and Dick Day assists with these problems. Mr. Downey said if the County is not going to use the product, then the contract should be terminated. Commissioner Schmidt asked if it was the responsibility of a Commissioner to make arrangements for training. Mrs. Pruss reported that the County Attorney's office has been in contact with Aldtec who was unable to make requested changes in the software. She said that Dick Day told her that some updates were made that may help with the Courthouse issues. Commissioner Uhlir stated that the County needs to hold Aldtec accountable for the service needed by the County and one of the Commissioners may need to contact the company to resolve the problem. He said that a new system is more difficult and time consuming to learn.
