COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS

Madison, Nebraska

February 25, 2025

The Board of County Commissioners of Madison County, Nebraska met in regular session at 9:30 A.M.

Advanced notice of meeting was published in the Wednesday, February 19, 2025 edition of the Norfolk Daily News. A copy of said notice was mailed to each Board member. An affidavit of acknowledgment of receipt of notice of meeting as published was executed.

Following a moment of Silence and the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, Chairman Troy Uhlir called the meeting to order and notified the public of the copy of the Open Meetings Act posted in the meeting room.

Present: Commissioners Ron Schmidt, Eric Stinson, and Troy Uhlir, County Clerk Anne Pruss, County Highway Superintendent Richard Johnson, County Sheriff Todd Volk, County Attorney Joe Smith, Road Foremen Tom Borchers, Jeff Schroeder and John Hrabanek. Norfolk Daily News reporter Austin Svehla and NCN reporter Hanky Hazelton were present along with nine citizens.

Commissioner Uhlir read the following consent agenda items into the record:

- 1) Approval of minutes of February 11, 2025 meeting
- 2) Approval of cost increases to purchase borrow up to \$1.75 per yard with, \$250.00 rent for pasture land and \$350.00 rent for crop land per acre when purchasing from private parties
- 3) Authorization to advertise for Managed IT Service
- 4) Authorization for County Board Chairman to request concurrence from the City of Norfolk for Project BRO-7059(17), Norfolk North, with an overtopping frequency of 2 years.

RESOLUTION #2025-8

WHEREAS, Richard C. Johnson, Madison County Highway Superintendent, has submitted a written report to the Madison County Board of Commissioners as directed by Resolution #2025-7 dated February 11, 2025; and

WHEREAS, State Statutes require, that prior to taking action upon vacation or abandonment of a county road, the County Board shall conduct a public hearing on same; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners wishes to receive public input on the proposed road vacation or abandonment,

Poppy Drive from the Northwest corner of Lot 22 to a line between the Northeast corner of 15 and the Southeast corner of Lot 11 AND North 47th Circle from the South line of Lot 15 to Poppy Drive all in the Pines Subdivision in SW ¼ of Section 7, Township 24 North, Range 1 West of the 6th P.M., Madison County, Nebraska

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that a public hearing be held on March 25, 2025 at 9:30 A.M. in the Commissioners' room at the Courthouse in Madison, Nebraska to receive input regarding abandonment or vacation of all or part of the following described road:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution be published once a week for three consecutive weeks in The Norfolk Daily News and, if possible, copies of this resolution be served by certified mail to owners of land abutting on or adjacent to said roads.

RESOLUTION #2025-9

WHEREAS, the Madison County Board of Commissioner is in need of Petty Cash account established for Madison County Sheriff's Department.

WHEREAS, The Petty Cash account is established for extradition costs or expensed that occur with any foreseeability, and which requires immediate payment.

WHEREAS, Pursuant 23-106(2) Rev. Neb. Stat. (Reissue 1943), this Board of Commissioners shall have the authority to establish a petty cash fund and set by resolution the amount of money to be carried in such petty cash fund and the dollar limit of an expenditure from such fund.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THIS the Madison County Board of Commissioners that hereby established a petty cash fund in the checking account not to exceed \$4,000.00 dollars for the Madison County Sheriff's Department.

Motion made by Stinson and seconded by Schmidt to approve the consent agenda for the meeting. Roll call vote: Ayes, Schmidt, Stinson, and Uhlir. Nays, none. Motion carried.

Motion made by Schmidt and seconded by Stinson to approve the regular agenda for the meeting. Roll call vote: Ayes, Schmidt, Stinson, and Uhlir. Nays, none. Motion carried.

Pursuant to published legal notice in the February 5, 12, and 19, 2025 edition of the Norfolk Daily News, Chairman Uhlir opened at public hearing at 9:34 A.M. to receive citizens' comments regarding the road construction program for 2024 and the six-year road improvement plan.

County Highway Superintendent Richard Johnson reported that State law requires the County to file a one and six year road improvement plan with the Board of Classifications and Standards prior to March 1st of each year. He explained that the plan outlines the projects to be completed in year one and proposals for the following five years. A map was distributed during the hearing which reflected the locations of the proposed projects.

Mr. Johnson reported that they have completed initial projects. He outlined several parts of the project's eventual completion. The first of which, is Norfolk Crush road, concreting First Street, and Nucor Road; and to their knowledge is running well. He also reported two box culverts were completed in District 3. One culvert located near Iowa Valley cemetery was poured however, due to winter weather it was put on a temporary hold until spring. He reported that the last culvert near Newman Grove will hopefully be completed in the middle of April, nonetheless this may be limited due to winter conditions.

Mr. Johnson continued to report that the Boone County Line Road project had significant progress. He identified three miles from the asphalt going into Newman Grove were pulverized and recoated. He informed of several spots that may need additional attention this spring.

Mr. Johnson reported that during this year several additional projects occurring. He identified that the asphalt bid during 2024 will begin construction. He explained that the approximately eight miles, involved in the project, were patched last fall. Additionally Mr. Johnson advised that there will be a pre-construction conference with Western Engineering before the scheduled start date of March 31.

Mr. Johnson explained that from July to September approximately 11 miles will begin construction by Knife River. In regard to additional projects towards the south of the county near Meadow Grove, Mr. Johnson identified bridge number 1320, 10405, and 13215 which will need box culverts. He described the CBMP Projects, which are small bridge replacements, which will be replaced with culverts either 7 or 10 foot diameter, and two or three culverts with head walls. He stated that some bridges, such as Helena and bridge 03330, still need to be designed. He advised that the NDOT reimburses the County 55 percent of the cost and the County is able to have its own crew install each of them, which saves money.

Mr. Johnson advised that the Producer's Bridge ideally needs to be built south so as to allow better alignment and keep the current bridge open while construction occurs. A clear determination has not been made as of yet. He also reported that once the Producer's bridge has been completed Dowd Concrete Paving will pave the "Mile Road" from approximately Highway 121 to the Cowboy Trail going west on McAllister.

Mr. Johnson went on to discuss the long-term plan for the Agrex Road near the *Tyson* plant in which includes an asphalt overlay. He also explained a sidewalk is planned to divert pedestrians from the road near the *Tyson* plant.

Mr. Johnson addressed the North Fork North Bridge on Eisenhower Avenue and the letter requesting concurrence from the city on the Agenda. He advised that the bridge has been closed since 2019 and that hydraulics were ran and approved with a three-year over topping however, the Corps. Of Engineers performed a new drainage study which called for an additional 10,000 CFS to the flow. He advised that with their current plan they could complete, with a time-period over two years, over topping. Mr. Johnson expressed his preference to review concurrence from the city, as it is within their zoning jurisdiction.

Mr. Johnson informed the Board of a RAISE grant application in an attempt to assist in the extension of the bypass from Northeast Industrial Highway and Highway 81 West, then south to Highway 275 to reduce truck traffic in Norfolk. The RAISE grant is expected to cover 100% of the cost for the bypass extension.

A member from the public requested clarification for the location of Porter's Bridge. Mr. Johnson informed them of the location. He also clarified that the Norfolk North Bridge would have 80 percent federal funding and 20 percent state funding with potentially no funds provided by the county. Another member of the public questioned the potential completion date for the bridge on Eisenhower and commenting that if the second phase was completed in May or June it would be agreeable. Mr. Johnson concurred and advised that the completion date would be the year of 2026.

No one from the public spoke during the public hearing. Chairman Uhlir closed the hearing at 9:54 A.M.

After discussion, the following resolution was introduced:

RESOLUTION #2025-10

WHEREAS, pursuant to published legal notice, public hearing on the one year and six year Road Improvement Programs for Madison County was held, and

WHEREAS, Richard C. Johnson, Madison County Highway Superintendent has presented the one year and six year Road Programs, and

WHEREAS, said Road Programs, as presented, have been given due consideration,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the one year Road Program and the six-year Road Program, as presented, are hereby accepted.

Motion was made by Schmidt and seconded by Stinson that the foregoing resolution be adopted. Roll call vote: Ayes, Stinson, Schmidt, and Uhlir. Nays, none. Motion carried.

County Sheriff Todd Volk approached the board with a request to establish a donation fund for a K-9 unit. He explained that the sheriff's office has had two separate K-9's previously. He reported that due to the amount of illicit substances in the County it would be prudent to add a K-9 dog to the department. He continued to explain that there have been several businesses and individuals who have expressed interest in donating funds to the K-9 dog. He also explained that the K-9 would take approximately a year to establish through purchases and training, nonetheless setting up a fund preemptively for donations would be prudent.

Chairman Uhlir questioned the approximate cost for a K-9. Mr. Volk stated that through his and his deputy's research a K-9 can be up to \$15,000.00. He explained that the costs arise from training, state certification, and vehicle equipment. Commissioner Ron Schmidt questioned the length of service for the K-9. Mr. Volk advised that the approximate age would be five to six years.

Commissioner Ron Schmidt questioned the yearly cost for the K-9. Mr. Volk stated that the approximate yearly cost would be \$1,500.00 to \$3,000.00 per year. Commissioner Ron Schmidt questioned operating procedures and the benefits of the K-9. Mr. Volk advised that using the K-9 could be used in schools, jail, and investigations to protect the officers and the public

Chairman Troy Uhlir questioned coverage for insurance and whether NIRMA would cover the K-9. County Clerk Anne Pruss advised that there would be no additional costs. She stated that they contacted NIRMA and confirmed that there would no additional cost for liability coverage of on the law enforcement officer. She stated that an email will need to be sent to NIRMA of the breed, classification, and the handler's name.

Mr. Volk commented that they would prefer to have a full service K-9. He also explained the statute regarding law enforcement officers assisting across county lines. He reiterated his request to establish a donation fund for the K-9.

County Clerk Anne Pruss expressed that as budget committee they will need to obtain the cost of the K-9 and how it will be paid whether by donations only or if tax dollars will be used or in conjunction. Mr. Volk confirmed that state auditors were contacted the previous week. Chairman Troy Uhlir questioned if County Attorney Joe Smith wished to add anything. County Attorney Joe Smith stated that the longer a K-9 takes to arrive during a stop the more likely evidence is suppressed. He suggested that the more K-9's available the less chance of evidence suppression due to wait times. Commissioner Ron Schmidt questioned whether there will need to be an increase in funding to the County Jail due to higher arrest rates.

Mr. Volk suggested that if the K-9 performed well it could lead to a request for more funding for the County Jail. County Clerk Anne Pruss suggested that outreach to other counties who have recently started a K-9 program to gauge what increase, if any would be needed.

Motion made by Stinson and second by Schmidt authorizing the County Sheriff department to look into costs for K-9 Dog specifically trained to assist members of law enforcement an establishing a new budget function for the 2025-2026 fiscal year. Roll call vote: Ayes, Stinson, Schmidt, and Uhlir. Nays, none. Motion carried.

County Clerk Anne Pruss explained that previously the State Institution function in the general fund have exceeded the amount that had been budgeted. The proposal is to take and transfer \$100,000.00 to the said fund to cover costs incurred until the end of the fiscal year, which would include two emergency protective custody cases.

After discussion, the following resolution was introduced:

RESOLUTION #2025-11

WHEREAS, due to unforeseen circumstances, proposed expenditures for 2024-2025 fiscal budget year exceeded budget authority allocated for the State Institutions office function in the General Fund, and

WHEREAS, budget authority in the Miscellaneous General, also an office function of the General Fund budget, is adequate to allow for a transfer to meet current fiscal year expenditures for the State Institutions office function,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that an additional one hundred thousand dollars and zero cents (\$100,000.00) of budget authority is hereby allocated to the State Institutions office function from the Miscellaneous General office function.

Motion was made by Stinson and seconded by Schmidt that the foregoing resolution be adopted. Roll call vote: Ayes, Stinson, Schmidt, and Uhlir. Nays, none. Motion carried.
